Hampton Park Primary School is committed to providing a safe and respectful learning environment where bullying will not be tolerated.

The purpose of this policy is to:

explain the definition of bullying so that there is shared understanding amongst all members of the Hampton Park Primary School community

make clear that no form of bullying at Hampton Park Primary School will be tolerated outline the strategies and programs in place at Hampton Park Primary School to build a positive school culture and prevent bullying behaviour

ask that everyone in our school community be alert to signs and evidence of bullying behaviour, and understands the importance of reporting bullying behaviour to school staff ensure that all reported incidents of bullying are appropriately investigated and addressed ensure that support is provided to students who may be affected by bullying behaviour (including targets, bystanders, witnesses and students engaging in bullying behaviour) seek parental and peer group support in addressing and preventing bullying behaviour at Hampton Park Primary School.

When responding to bullying behaviour, Hampton Park Primary School aims to:

be proportionate, consistent and responsive find a constructive solution for everyone stop the bullying from happening again restore the relationships between the students involved.

Hampton Park Primary School acknowledges that school staff owe a duty of care to students to take reasonable steps to reduce the risk of reasonably foreseeable harm, which can include harm that may be caused by bullying behaviour.

This policy addresses how Hampton Park Primary School aims to prevent, address and respond to student bullying behaviour. Hampton Park Primary School recognises that there are many other types of inappropriate student behaviours that do not meet the definition of bullying which are also unacceptable at our school. These other inappropriate behaviours will be managed in accordance with our *Student Code of Conduct* and *Student Wellbeing and Engagement Policy* and *Inclusion and Diversity policy, Tiered Behaviour Interventions and Classroom Management.*

This policy applies to all school activities, including camps and excursions. It also applies to

Many distressing and inappropriate behaviours may not constitute bullying even though they are unpleasant. Students who are involved in or who witness any distressing and inappropriate behaviours should report their concerns to school staff and our school will follow our

When notified of alleged bullying behaviour, school staff are required to:

- 1. record the details of the allegations in SENTRAL; and
- 2. inform Student Wellbeing Team or Principal Class.

The Leading Teacher and Student Wellbeing Teacher is responsible for investigating allegations of bullying in a timely and sensitive manner. To appropriately investigate an allegation of bullying, the teacher in charge may:

speak to the those involved in the allegations, including the target/s, the students allegedly engaging in bullying behaviour/s and any witnesses to the incidents speak to the parent/carer(s) of the students involved speak to the teachers of the students involved take detailed notes of all discussions for future reference obtain written statements from all or any of the above.

All communications with the Leading Teacher of Student Wellbeing Teacher in the course of investigating an allegation of bullying will be managed sensitively. Investigations will be completed as quickly as possible to allow for the behaviours to be addressed in a timely manner.

The objective of completing a thorough investigation into the circumstances of alleged bullying behaviour is to determine the nature of the conduct and the students involved. A thorough understanding of the alleged bullying will inform staff about how to most effectively implement an appropriate response to that behaviour.

Serious bullying, including serious cyberbullying, is a criminal offence and may be referred to Victoria Police. For more information, see: Brodie's Law.

When the Leading Teacher or Student Wellbeing Teacher has sufficient information to understand the circumstances of the alleged bullying and the students involved, a number of strategies may be implemented to address the behaviour and support affected students in consultation with the Assistant Principal, Principal, SSSOs or Department of Education and Training specialist staff.

There are a number of factors that will be considered when determining the most appropriate response to the behaviour. When making a decision about how to respond to bullying behaviour, Hampton Park Primary School will consider:

the age, maturity and individual circumstances of the students involved the severity and frequency of the bullying, and the impact it has had on the target student whether the student/s engaging in bullying behaviour have displayed similar behaviour before whether the bullying took place in a group or one-to-one context whether the students engaging in bullying behaviour demonstrates insight or remorse for their behaviour the alleged motive of the behaviour.

The Leading Teacher or Student Wellbeing Teacher may implement all, or some of the following

- the students engaging in the bullying behaviour
- o affected students, including witnesses and/or friends of the target student.

Facilitate a restorative practice meeting with all or some of the students involved. The objective of restorative practice is to repair relationships that have been damaged by bringing about a sense of remorse and restorative action on the part of the person who has bullied someone and forgiveness by the person who has been bullied.

Facilitate a mediation between some or all of the students involved to help to encourage students to take responsibility for their behaviour and explore underlying reasons for conflict or grievance. Mediation is only suitable if all students are involved voluntarily and demonstrate a willingness to engage in the mediation process.

Facilitate a process using the Support Group Method, involving the target student(s), the students engaging in bullying behaviour and a group of students who are likely to be supportive of the target(s).

Implement a Method of Shared Concern process with all students involved in the bullying. Facilitate a Student Support Group meeting and/or Behaviour Support Plan for affected students.
